Secondly, due to the Middle East's growing importance in international affairs, there has been an increased need for Arabic speakers, especially where there is a shortage of qualified persons from the west who are fluent in the Arabic language and understand the culture. courses for all levels, and courses in literature, Arabic studies and Arab culture. Courses are offered year long. For those who cannot attend classes on campus, some are available online. The University also offers a study abroad program (Montclair in Amman) where students can earn nine credits. The program also includes field trips and hands-on activities that help students immerse themselves in the culture and practice the language with native speakers. Additionally, the Arab Student Association (ASA) organizes weekly activities that expose students to Arabic language and culture.
