**If you transferred into MSU with an AA or an AS degree from a NJ community college, your Gen Ed requirements should have been waived. If you transferred in with an AAS degree from a NJ community college or with coursework from another institution of higher education, your transfer courses were assessed on a course-by-course basis. If some of your courses transferred in as free electives, but you think that they should count toward your General Education, World Language and Culture, or Major Requirements, please submit a credit adjustment form to the department(s) offering the course(s) for which you think your transfer course(s) can substitute. (Whether or not a transfer course is an adequate substitute for a Montclair State University course will be determined by each department).*

***If you are a transfer or second Bachelor's student for whom General Education requirements have been waived, you are still required to fulfill the World Languages and Cultures Requirement.*

****Students wishing to continue a language with which they have some prior experience, either academic or personal, must take a placement test. If they place at the 2nd semester level, they must take 6 semester hours (two sequential world language courses) to fulfill the requirement. If they place at the third semester level or higher, they must take only 3 semester hours (one world language course) at the level at which they place OR a course in English about a foreign culture or civilization. Students who are fluent in another language who can pass a language proficiency exam at the NYU School of Continuing Education (brochures are available in the Center for Advising and Student Transitions in Webster Hall) will not have to fulfill the World Languages requirement.*

#The Didactic Program in Dietetics (DPD)

- 1. The Didactic Program in Dietetics (DPD) is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics (ACEND) of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics.*
- 2. Students who complete their Bachelor of Science in Nutrition and Food Science-Dietetics are entitled, upon request and completion of an application, to receive an ACEND Verification Statement. This statement is required when students apply to ACEND-accredited dietetic internship programs which are required of individuals who wish to become registered dietitians.*
- 3. To obtain an ACEND Verification Statement, a grade of "C" or better must be attained in all DPD coursework. The DPD coursework includes ALL of the following courses:*

- A. Nutrition and Food Science Core*
- B. Dietetics Concentration Requirements*
- C. Dietetics Required Collateral Courses*
- D. Fundamentals of Speech (CMST-101)*
- E. College Writing I (WRIT-105)*

Please note: A "C-" does NOT meet this requirement. Students in the Dietetics concentration who earn a C- in a DPD course and who wish to eventually obtain an ACEND Verification Statement must obtain special permission to repeat that course for credit by sending an email to the Department Administrator Maddy Antosiewicz at antosiewicm@mail.montclair.edu. There is no special approval required to repeat a course in which a grade of "F", "D-", "D", or "D+" was received. When a course is repeated, both the original and subsequent courses are included on the permanent record, but the credit is counted only once and the grade received in the repeated course becomes the official final grade. The grade for a course repeated at another institution cannot replace a grade for a course completed at Montclair State University.

- 4. Students who wish to become Nutrition and Food Science - Dietetics majors must have at least a 3.2 GPA. This applies to:*

- A. Students who's major is currently undeclared*
- B. Students currently in majors other than the Nutrition and Food Science-Dietetics (including students in other Nutrition and Food Science concentrations)*
- C. Students transferring to MSU from other institutions*

- 5. While meeting the minimum credit requirements for transfers (see your degree audit for more information) and with prior approval from the department, students may take DPD courses at other institutions. However, the following courses must be taken at Montclair State University:*

- A. NUFD-452 (Organization and Management of Foodservice Systems)*
- B. NUFD-258 (Experimental Food Science)*
- C. NUFD-382 (Advanced Nutrition)*
- D. NUFD-412 (Nutrition Education Techniques)*
- E. NUFD-488 (Medical Nutrition Therapy)*
- F. NUFD-499 (Medical Nutrition Applications)*

- 6. For transfer and second Bachelor's students, biochemistry must have been completed within the past 10 years.*
