What is public health?

- When most people think of health careers, they think of clinical careers – like doctor or nurse – that involve treating individuals who have diseases or injuries.
- Public health professionals try to improve the health of *whole populations* and focus on *prevention of injury or disease* as well as *promotion* of optimal health.

 - <u>Concentration in Community Health Education</u>: How to plan, implement and evaluate public health programs, communicate health messages, and organize communities around health issues
 OR
 - <u>Concentration in Health Systems Administration and Policy</u>: How to organize and manage hospitals and healthcare systems with a focus on prevention and in service to social justice

Will I be able to find a job when I graduate?

- Job growth (16%) for community health educators and community health workers is projected to outpace other professions through 2026. (National Bureau of Labor Statistics)
- Job growth (20%) for medical and health managers and administrators is projected to outpace other professions through 2026. (*National Bureau of Labor Statistics*)
- By 2020, the nation will face a shortfall of more than 250,000 public health workers including public health physicians, nurses, epidemiologists, health educators, and administrators. (Association of Schools for Public Health)
