THIS HOLD WILL PREVENT ANY REGISTRATION ACTIVITY UNTIL IT IS REMOVED. STUDENTS WHO WANT TO LIVE IN CAMPUS HOUSING MUST PROVIDE PROOF OF HAVING RECEIVED A MENINGOCOCCAL MENINGITIS VACCINATION IN ORDER TO BE ASSIGNED A SPACE IN CAMPUS HOUSING .

NEW JERSEY STATE LAW

requires that **all undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in a program of study leading to an academic degree and born after 1956** must provide the university with proof of having received **two injections of Measles vaccine and at least one injection of Mumps and Rubella vaccine**, either separately or as a combined MMR vaccination, or **laboratory proof of immunity to each of these infections**. **Students must get this information from their health care provider.**

All incoming students must be provided with information about **Meningitis** and the availability and benefits of the meningitis vaccine. **All incoming students must complete and return the survey below.**

All new students enrolled in a program of study leading to an academic degree at a public or private institution of higher education **who reside in a campus residential facility must receive a meningococcal vaccination as a condition of residence and attendance** at that institution.

Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Hepatitis B, and Meningitis immunizations are available at the Health Center for a nominal fee.

NEW JERSEY STATE STATUTE IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

MEASLES, MUMPS, RUBELLA, MENINGITIS

All new or continuing undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in a program of study leading to an academic degree at any 4-year public or independent institution of higher education in NJ are required to provide evidence of immunization as a prerequisite to enrollment as follows:

Measles: Evidence of two doses of a live measles-containing vaccine, or any vaccine combination containing live measles vaccine that was administered after 1968 - first dose administered on or after the student's first birthday and second dose administered no less than one month after the first dose, or documented laboratory evidence of measles immunity. A student vaccinated with a killed measles containing vaccine, or an unknown vaccine prior to 1969, must be revaccinated or produce laboratory proof of measles immunity.

Mumps: One dose of live mumps virus vaccine, or any vaccine combination containing live mumps virus vaccine on or after the student's first birthday, or documented laboratory evidence of mumps immunity.

Rubella: One dose of live rubella virus vaccine, or any vaccine combination containing live rubella virus vaccine on or after the student's first birthday, or documented laboratory evidence of rubella immunity.

Meningitis: One dose of meningococcal vaccine for all new full-time students residing in campus residence halls, as a condition of attendance.

The only exemptions from these requirements are students born before 1957, students enrolled in a program for which students *never* congregate on campus, whether for classes or to participate in institution-sponsored events (home study, distance learning, campus events), certain medical conditions in which immunizations pose a health risk, and clearly proscribed and documented religious exclusions.

The University must enforce student compliance within 60 days of enrollment.

A student may be registered on a provisional basis for the first term if the required immunization documentation is not available at the time of registration. ***Prior to registration for the second term, a student must either present documentation of immunization or proof of immunity as outlined above or be re-immunized.***

Documented proof of immunity **must** be submitted to the Health Center. Forms for this purpose are available from the Admissions Office and the Health Center.

Failure to submit the required documentation will result in a hold being placed on your record. This hold will prevent you from registering for classes.

MENINGITIS

Meningococcal disease is a potentially fatal bacterial infection commonly referred to as meningitis. Cases of meningitis among teens and young adults 15 to 24 years of age have more than doubled since 1991. The disease strikes about 3,000 Americans each year and claims about 300 lives. Between 100 and 125 meningitis cases occur on college campuses and as many as 15 students will die from the disease.

A vaccine is available that protects against four types of the bacteria that cause meningitis in the United States – types A, C, Y and W-135. These types account for nearly two thirds of the meningitis cases among college students.

On October 20, 1999, the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) voted to recommend that college students be educated about meningitis and the benefits of vaccination. The panel based its recommendation on recent studies showing that college students, particularly freshman living in residence halls, have a six-fold increased risk for meningitis. The recommendation further states that information about the disease and vaccination is appropriate

for other undergraduate students who also wish to reduce their risk for the disease.

The State of New Jersey requires that all full and part-time incoming college freshmen, transfer and graduate students be provided with this information. Documentation of the student's decision whether or not to receive the vaccination must be recorded by each University.

The State of New Jersey also requires that all students new to campus housing provide evidence of having been immunized against meningococcal meningitis as a condition of residence and attendance. Students who fail to provide this documentation will not be given a campus housing assignment.
