Child marriage & Key Terms

Arranged marriage - both the bride and the groom consent to have their marriage arranged (with varying degrees of choice about when and whom to wed).

Forced marriage - one or both of them is coerced into the marriage and does not give full, free, informed consent.

What enables child marriage to take place?

- ☐ Parental force

Effects of Child Marriage

- □ Domestic violence
- □ Lack of education
- ☐ Isolation from family and friends
- Sexual abuse and unwanted pregnancies
- ☐ Emotional abuse
- □ Self-harm
- ☐ Suicide

Effects of Child Marriage

- □ 23% increased risk of:
 - ☐ Heart attack
 - Diabetes
 - □ Cancer
 - □ Stroke
- ☐ Higher rates of sexually transmitted diseases
- ☐ Higher death rates resulting from:
 - ☐ Childbirth
 - ☐ Unwanted pregnancies
 - Pregnancy termination
- Increased risk of psychiatric disorders
 - ☐ Antisocial personality disorder
 - ☐ Major depressive disorder
 - ☐ Nicotine dependence
 - □ Phobias

- Yasmine is an American citizen born to Palestinian parents
- ☐ Her mother took her to Palestine "to visit family members"
- ☐ Forced into marriage at 15 years old to a 25 year old man
- ☐ Lived in Palestine for 3 months; didn't even know her husband's last name
- □ Secretly communicated with American friends through Facebook
- □ Contacted U.S. Embassy

- ☐ U.S. Embassy brought Yasmine back to America
 - Disowned by family
 - ☐ Lived in several foster homes
 - ☐ Took mother to court to revoke parental rights
 - □ Adopted at age 16
- ☐ Currently studies at Illinois State University

HOW DO STATE LAWS ON MINIMUM MARRIAGE AGE COMPARE?

In October 2017

- 25 states do not set <u>any</u> age floor by statute
- 3 states (Virginia, Texas, and New York, in order of enactment) limit marriage to legal adults
- In 8 states and Washington, DC, clerks alone – without judges – can approve marriages of all minors
- Only 17 states require judges to consider the minors' best interests
- 9 states expressly permit pregnancy to lower the minimum marriage age

Child marriage in the U.S.

- □ Between 2000 and 2010, over 160,000 people under age 17 were married in the U.S.
- New Hampshire is one of many U.S. states which allows 13 year olds to be married with judicial consent
- California tried to abolish underage marriage, but had to adjust the bill to allow underage marriage with judicial consent
- ☐ In May 2017, New Jersey Governor Chris Christie vetoed a bill that would prohibit people under age 18 to be married
