A "Neapolitan" Carmen. This, in his director's notes, is how Mario Martone defines the lead role in his latest production. A Carmen who, in the eyes of the director, takes cues from the models of popular musical theatre ranging from Raffaele Viviani to melodrama. It is for this reason that Mario Martone asked Enzo Moscato, the voice of contemporary Naples, to write the script - "a script which has dialogues and characters inspired by tradition but which takes cues from Mérimée's novella as well as Bizet's opera" – and Mario Tronco to revisit the score with the contamination of music and song from far-off lands. A sadly contemporary story, Carmen is a tragedy which plays out every day around the world, a phenomena which is today defined with the word "femicide", but which in the past in Italy was known as "a crime of passion" The lead role and Cosé are played by a much-loved couple from contemporary Neapolitan theatre, Iaia Forte and Roberto De Francesco, while a wealthy company of actors and singers both Neapolitan and immigrant will fill the stage alongside the musicians from the Orchestra di Piazza Vittorio. All immersed in a timeless Naples, a setting which evokes the City in the post-war period, in turmoil, with hope for the future, but also the Naples postearthquake of the 1980s, right up to echoes of the city of today, of the criminality of our present.



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
