Dr. Kim earned her PhD in Family Studies and Human Development with a minor in Educational Policy from the University of Arizona. She comes to Montclair from Teachers College, Columbia University, where she was a postdoctoral research fellow.

Her research examines family racialethnic socialization, identity, educational experiences, and sociopolitical

development of Asian American youth. She is committed to advancing racial justice for Asian Americans and translating knowledge that can be useful for families, schools, and community partners.

In the Fall 2023 semester, Dr. Kim is teaching FSHD 200 - Intro to Family Science and Human Development, and FSHD 314 - Child Development II. We welcome her to our FSHD family!

Saluting Our Hispanic Community

The US Hispanic population, at more than 19%, is the nation's largest ethnic minority. From September 15 through October 15, we celebrate the cultures and contributions of Hispanic and Latinx Americans with National Hispanic Heritage Month. The timing of this observance intentionally overlaps with the Independence Days of many Latin American countries.

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Alumni Spotlight

Roxanne Ruiz-Adams

Roxanne Ruiz-Adams graduated from the FSHD program in 2008 with a concentration in Family Services.

Her Path: I entered Montclair State University as a psychology major. In reality, I didn't know what I wanted to do as a profession, so I just took the general education classes like everyone else. When it was time to choose an elective, I enrolled in Dr. Jonathan Caspi's *Sibling Relationships* class. It was a wonderful class that gave so much insight into family dynamics and really boosted my desire to work with families. After that elective, I switched my major to Family and Child Studies (now FSHD), which is what put me on my path.



At the time, the major required us to do internships and observations. In my first-year internship with Dr. Reid's Project C.O.P.E., I did field work with a social worker from Rutgers. Once I was in the field, I knew social work would allow me to help people in emotional distress much faster than a psychology degree. I really felt for the at-risk youth we were working with, and the way I was able to assess family dynamics. In my senior year, I

was once again required to do a field observation of a family service agency. I found the Family Service League in Montclair, which is a Minuchin-style training center. After I completed my service there, they invited me back as an intern even before I was accepted to any social work program.

Her Career: I hold a Master's in Social Work from Fordham University and a Doctorate in Social Work from Rutgers University. My research focused on conducting family therapy with bilingual families. I own a private group practice in Montclair with two other clinicians, and I teach as a lecturer in the Social Work Program at the Graduate College of Health Professions in Kean University (all while becoming a new mom this year!).

Her Thoughts: Embrace the journey of life, for it's perfectly fine not to always end up where you initially envisioned; in fact, such unexpected detours often lead to extraordinary discoveries. Know that the path to success is not linear, but rather a meandering route of exploration, learning, and growth.

I also want students to recognize that while direct assistance to those in need can be impactful, often the most potent way to effect enduring change is by addressing and altering the systems within which they exist, be they familial or societal.

The Lifeline's message for Suicide Prevention Month -- #BeThe1To -- helps spread the word about actions we can all take to prevent suicide, promote healing, help and give hope.

Be the one to...Ask

Research shows people who are having thoughts of suicide feel relief when someone asks about them in a caring way. Acknowledging and talking about suicide may reduce, rather than increase, suicidal ideation.

Be the one to...Be There

Individuals are more likely to feel less depressed, less overwhelmed, less suicidal, and more hopeful after speaking to someone who listens without judgment.

Be the one to...Keep Them Safe

A number of studies have indicated that when lethal means are made less available or less deadly, suicide rates by that method decline, and frequently suicide rates overall decline.

Be the one to...Help Them Stay Connected

Studies indicate that helping an at-risk person create a network of resources and individuals for support and safety can help them take positive action and reduce feelings of hopelessness.

Be the one to...Follow Up

Studies have also shown that brief, low cost intervention and supportive, ongoing contact may be an important part of suicide prevention, especially for individuals after they have been discharged from hospitals or care services.

Immigration Lawyer

Immigration lawyers provide advice and legal representation to individuals, families, and businesses for issues and processes related to immigration, visas, citizenship and political asylum.



The responsibilities related to serving In this professional role could be to:

- Provide legal advice to individuals seeking to understand their options, rights, and obligations under immigration laws. Assess an individual's eligibility for programs or visas.
- Help individuals acquire citizenship or legal immigration status. Assist with paperwork and gathering documentation for work/student visas, asylum, permanent residency (green cards), and citizenship.
- Represent and advocate for clients during immigration hearings and other legal proceedings.
- Resolve visa-related problems and issues that may affect immigration status.
- Defend clients facing deportation. Explore avenues for relief, such as asylum claims or waivers.
- Help businesses comply with immigration laws and regulations by establishing procedures for verifying employment eligibility, and obtaining work visas or permits for foreign employees.

To pursue a career as an Immigration Lawyer, FSHD grads would need to acquire a law degree and possess strong skills in research, analytical thinking, and problem solving. Proficiency in other languages would round out the abilities necessary to be successful in this field.
