

Background

- + There are 17 SDGs with accompanying 169 targets set in **2015**.
- + Target 8.7 aimed at having a global commitment to eradicate forced labour, modern slavery, human trafficking, and child labour, as well as to secure safe working conditions and protection for all workers by 2025.





Estimates



- + There are over **52 million** people trafficked globally IOM, ILO, Walk Free Foundation
 - + **11.8 million** women and girls
 - + Number of girls have increase by 38%
 - + 3.3 million children are in some form of forced labour
 - + Over half of children are found in commercial sex exploitation
- + **63% of trafficking** victims detected worldwide were female-UNOCD 2024
- + Children now account for the majority of trafficking victims detected globally- UNOCD 2024
- + A third of all cross-border human trafficking flows involve citizens of Africa- UNOCD 2024

Child Marriage


- Asia have two thirds of all forced marriages (14.2 million
- 4 Africa 14.5 per cent (3.2 million)

Domestic Work, Agriculture and Manufacturing Child Soldiers (internal trafficking)

Organ thefts/harvest

+ 0.2% of detected victims of trafficking (UNODC)

North Africa and Middle East reporting the highest cases.






Causes

- +Poverty and
- #Political will
- +Global fund cuts for humanitarian work including migration.
- +Climate Disasters and Conflicts
- +Weak institutional responses i.e prosecution and conviction compared to the magnitude of the current estimates.

Cooperate and Innovation


- + Companies are improving on ethical sourcing of product
- + Use of technology for awareness, prosecution and data collection and sharing





Way Forward


- We must promote ethical recruitment to protect abuse and fraudulent activities.
